"Memorial Plaques Become A Reality"

Keep the Memories Alive

Nitro Memorial Plaques



Plaques honoring the crews of both the USS Nitro (AE-2) and (AE-23) are now in the process of being made. We have signed off on the designs that are on page 6 of this newsletter. Although the design varies slightly from the ones submitted to the Navy Memorial, due primarily to their guidelines, the information about the ships and the pictures chosen are as submitted.

The original single plaque design, submitted to our membership, would have been dedicated to the crews of both ships. However, the response for funding of the plaque was overwhelming and we ended up having enough funds for two plaques. We then went back to the drawing board and came up with a plaque design for each ship.

The process of plaque design took some time and we saw many variations for each plaque. Bob Peiffer, our Association treasurer and webmaster, provided most of the plaque designs from which two of his final designs were chosen..

Most of the research on both ships came from various sources (Nitro Change of Command booklets, cruise books, online sources and Navy publications). Bob Eberlein then

contacted the Naval Archives to get confirmation on the awards for each ship

After a few rounds of changing words and their placement, we finally had plaques we felt we could submit to the Navy Memorial. The project was then handed off to Oscar Santiago, our very capable Master-At-Arms and Memorial Plaque project coordinator.

Oscar has been in touch with both the Navy Memorial's chief plaque designer as well as the office in charge of Memorial Plaque Wall, and has sheperded the project through the initial and subsequent redesign of the final plaque versions you will see on page 6. Through his contacts with the Navy Memorial, Oscar was able to have one of their board members (whom we found out is also x-Nitro) choose a very desirable location for the plaques on the Memorial Plaque Wall. The location of the AE-2 and AE-23 plaques on the Memorial Wall are spaces K56 and K57.

We, the board members of the Nitro Association, would like to thank everyone who made contributions to the plaque fund. As with the decommissioning and final dispositions of Navy ships, their names and what the crews who served aboard them have done fade from memory. The plaques to be dedicated in June will help preserve our ships' memories for all future generations visiting the Navy Memorial in Washington, DC.

Replicas of the USS Nitro Memorial Plaques may be ordered from the Navy Memorial. Please see the attached order forms for details. The cost of either the AE-2 or AE-23 plaque is \$125.00 until October 1st, the price will then be increased to \$150. This price includes shipping and handling. Order forms will also be available at the reunion..

Final Reunion agenda:

Thursday, 21 June - The hospitality suite at the Crowne Plaza will be open afternoon and evening for crewmember check-in. The Association business meeting will be held at 7 PM. The hotel will host a one-hour cheese and wine reception in the evening, prior to our business meeting.

Friday, 22 June - *This is going to be a long day, so be prepared.* We leave the hotel around 11 AM by motor coach and travel to the National Mall area of DC. From approximately Noon till 3:30 PM, our members and guests will be able to visit the monuments and memorials, which include Vietnam Veterans Memorial, Korean War Veterans Memorial, the WW2 Memorial, the Lincoln Memorial and Washington Monument. We will be providing bottled water for all of our attendees, as we did in Las Vegas, on the trip.

Important Note: We are not making any group reservations for the Washington Monument. Expect to have to deal with security checks at most monuments, most museums, government buildings and the White House while in Washington. It is suggested that anyone desiring to visit the Washington Monument during our time on the Mall make advanced reservations by either visiting the National Park Service ticketing website <http://reservations.nps.gov> or by calling 1.800.967.2283. There is a \$1.50 fee per order to reserve tickets ahead of time. These tickets may be picked up at the "will call" window of the monument ticket kiosk the day of your tour.

After our visit to the National Mall, we will take a short drive to the Jefferson Memorial so people who want to have their picture taken may do so.

About 4:30 - 5 PM the motor coaches will proceed to the Pentagon City Mall where you will be able to shop and have dinner (everyone will be on their own for dinner and shopping). We will meet at a central location about 7 PM and then travel to the USMC 8th & I barracks to view **the Marine Corps' Evening Parade**. We will be receiving 80 tickets for admission to this event, so depending on the number of reunion attendees this may be a **"first come, first served" event**. The parade starts at dusk and last approximately 1 hour and 15 minutes. We plan on returning to the hotel about 11 PM.

***** IMPORTANT "NEW" INFORMATION *****

We have made arrangements for one of our buses to take members who wish to return to the hotel after visiting the Pentagon City Mall. The buses will first drop off those going to the Marine Corp Evening parade, then one bus will go back to the hotel and return to 8th & I to pick up the tour group.

Saturday, 23 June - We will leave the hotel around 10AM and travel to the US Navy Memorial for our wreath laying & plaque dedication. After the ceremony, we will reboard the motor coaches and travel to Arlington National Cemetery.

While at Arlington National Cemetery, you will be able to visit the Tomb of the Unknowns, Women in Military Service

for America Memorial, the Kennedy gravesites, the Arlington Mansion and much more.

For those who have difficulty walking or climbing hills, you may want to purchase a ticket at the Visitor's Center for the Tourmobile. The cost for senior citizens is \$5.00, Adults \$6.00 and children (3-11) are \$3.00.

We will be returning to the Crowne Plaza around 5:20 PM and the Association dinner will start at 7 PM. The banquet room will be open at 6 PM for those of you who brought or would like to take a look at the auction items. The raffle/auction will begin as soon as dinner is completed.

Please fill out and return the attached activity form, with your payment, as soon as possible. **The latest we can accept activity forms and payments is May 15th.**

Crowne Plaza reminder:

As mentioned previously, we have reserved a block of rooms (a mixture of king and double bed) - 25 for Wednesday, 50 for Thursday night and 50 for Friday & Saturday night at the special guestroom rate of \$84/night plus tax. ***Wednesday night room are going fast and are available on a "first come, first served basis". Please make your reservations as soon as possible because the hotel can not guarantee additional rooms for Wednesday night.***

King, Queen double bed or Standard double-bedded rooms are available, with occupancy of up to four people per room. Both smoking and non-smoking rooms are available as well as handicap rooms. ***Anyone requiring special assistance should inform the hotel when making reservations.***

Each person will be responsible for making their reservations and may do so by calling the Crowne Plaza national reservation center at 800-227-6963 or the hotel at 703-471-6700.

When placing your reservation for the 2007 reunion, let the reservation clerk know you want to reserve a room for the **USS Nitro Association** reunion for "x" number of nights. Navy Times Article Recap



- 1) California limits Navy use of sonar training due to harmful effects on whales and marine mammals. Navy says it will not comply with restrictions.
- 2) Citing loss of confidence, CO of attack sub USS Minneapolis-St. Paul is sacked after 2 crewmen were swept overboard into the English Channel. Navy officials reviewing recent sub mishaps.
- 3) MCPON Campa shares vision of CPO's role in today's Navy. Emphasis on training of junior sailors and officers, enforcing institutional and technical standards.
- 4) Retired Generals bash Pres. Bush's troop "surge" proposal. General Petraeus, new commander of Multi-National Forces Iraq, says plan will work.
- 5) Congress and President at odds about war funding bill. Want way to measure progress and time limits for troop withdrawal.
- 6) 1,000 Guard and reserve members send an appeal for redress to congress. Asking for immediate end to war in Iraq.
- 7) New "honor" covers, with representation of American Flag, to cover caskets of fallen troops during transit, so proper respect can be achieved by personnel handling caskets
- 8) FCC looking to reduce fees for troops overseas to call home.
- 9) Navy Medical Center looking at deploying antibiotic beads to help in wound cases.
- 10) Naval "Brown-water" Riverine Squadron 1 deploys to Iraq.
- 11) Marksmanship training for fleet sailors to increase.
- 12) Aircraft Carrier JF Kennedy to be officially decommissioned in September; however, a decomm ceremony was held in March.
- 13) ADM William Fallon becomes first admiral to head Central Command.
- 14) Navy evaluating crew size for new LCS ships. May need higher manning levels. Congress reviewing cost overruns. Cost on first LCS has more than doubled and similar overrun is likely for the second LCS. Future LCS built with fixed-price contract.
- 15) USS Ronald Reagan CSG is caught in 'surge' of forces. Shorter than expected turn-around time.
- 16) USCG and Office of the Inspector General at odds over new deepwater cutter designs and oversight of contracts. Sen. John Kerry calls for termination of contract and asks for new bids.
- 17) Some military housing being rented to general public and is raising concerns in military.
- 18) SECDEF Gates wants 'stop-loss' retention, which prevents service members from getting out of service on schedule, minimized.
- 19) Force reduction - Navy plans to separate 23,000 sailors by 2013, while raising pay in certain critical rates is possible.
- 20) Naval aviation may shrink because of increased shipbuilding costs.
- 21) Navy Reserve to trim 3,500 billets next year.
- 22) Navy cleaning up former bombing and weapons training range in Vieques, Puerto Rico and finding thousands of unexploded bombs and munitions.
- 23) Posthumous award of Medal of Honor may be given to Navy seal LT Patrick Murphy.
- 24) War-zone E-6s get one-time shot at advancing to E-7 without having to take Chief's test. E-6's command must submit waiver.
- 25) Navy recruits 'Battle Stations' training to take place on board a 210' destroyer replica based on the Arleigh Burke class.
- 26) Walter Reed Medical Center under scrutiny for slow medical evaluations of injured troops as well as uninhabitable housing. Commanding General dismissed.
- 27) Citing security, USMC to restrict access to Hwy 172 to military stickered vehicles or cars with base visiting passes. Unpopular decision with locals using road as shortcut for decades.
- 28) VA Secretary and Congress battle White House over proposed budget increase.
- 29) USAF catches officer and airmen in child porn ring. Officer sentenced to 12 years. CMC at Naval Base Kitsap, WA. charged in child sex case.
- 30) New Arizona museum in Honolulu to be opened in Dec. 09.
- 31) City of Norfolk, VA to take over operation of former battleship Wisconsin.
- 32) Navy to pay extra for critical rates to extend their time at sea.
- 33) US analysts keeping a close eye on Iranian war games.
- 34) Ship repair yards looking for former sailors with machinist mate, enginemen and hull tech ratings. Reservists may be asked to pick up the slack.
- 35) Chaplain dismissed from Navy over military policy and nondenominational services.
- 36) New dry cargo/ammunition ship, Sacagawea, joins the fleet.
- 37) Former Navy QB still waiting to hear whether or not he will be allowed to stay in the service, after being acquitted of rape.
- 38) CNO Mullen seeks meetings with allies to discuss 1,000-ship world navy. Cooperation and intel sharing key to success.
- 39) National Guard looks for seat on Joint Chiefs. Committee reports a majority of Guard units are not ready for combat.
- 40) Officer promotions in British Navy on hold for at least next five years.
- 41) Navy investigating submarine, San Juan, 10-hour disappearance during training exercise.
- 42) Navy Seals and Special Warfare units recruiting fleet sailors.

- 43) Navy Medical Center, San Diego receiving positive reviews from troops receiving treatment for war related injuries.
- 44) Navy expands Bronze Star eligibility policy.
- 45) Marines to rotate billets in support of war with war billets, so every Marine shares in the fight.
- 46) GAO report indicates that securing and destroying Iraqi ammo bunkers were not a high priority on DOD list in 2003. Munition from bunkers is main source of roadside bombs.
- 47) Ships from 13 nations patrolling 2.4 million square miles off the coast of Africa in an attempt to stop pirate attacks.
- 48) Budgeting Army and USMC near term requirements may cut short other service requirements.

Corner


It has been almost a year since our gathering together for the NITRO Reunion in Las Vegas. Daily bulletins from the Mid-East indicate mounting casualties among our service members and the civilian populace. Perils are much in the news, even here at home, as we also remember the tragic loss of life here at home most recently on college campuses. Whether it is terrorism in Iraq or Afghanistan, or in the streets and schools of our own country, we have steady reminders that our world is unstable at best, and very scary at worst.

I share along with you the sorrow and concern for the victims and families of the young people killed and injured at Virginia Tech this week. The event is a sad reminder that things at home are not always as tranquil and safe as we would like them to be. This type of situation also highlights the peril our troops face daily in the many locations and situations throughout the world.

Those of us who served aboard NITRO are so aware that danger and peril are part of life in the military, and knowing one's mission and carrying that mission out in a proper, judicious, and safest way lends itself to successful operations and minimizing casualties. If the mission is not clear, or its methodology is not well-planned and executed, the end result will not be successful, and the likelihood of numerous and serious injuries and death becomes real.

As veterans, we have some serious ways we can support those who are now where we once were. First, we can do all we can to show the troops we DO care. Sharing things with our troops (greetings, items of personal comfort, etc.) is a


